University Freedoms and Responsibilities: Responding to the Challenges of the Future

The MCO Annual Conference was held in Hamilton Canada, October 16th and 17th 2019. The host of this conference was McMaster University in Hamilton. I attended as a student representative from the Croatian Student Council where I am leader of the Office for student standards. It was clear from the conference that universities are having to work increasingly hard, especially in providing high quality higher education in accordance with the Sustainable Development Goals, or SDGs. During this conference I saw that McMaster University is a great example of how a University and community can work together to create a better world, with greater sustainability.
