

#### Magna Charta Observatory (MCO)

The Magna Charta Observatory (MCO) is a global organization dedicated to safeguarding and promoting the fundamental values that underpin higher education, namely, academic freedom, institutional autonomy, and the societal responsibility of universities. Established in 1998 and based in Bologna, Italy, the MCO serves as the custodian of the Magna Charta Universitatum, a foundational declaration originally signed in 1988 by rectors of European universities to reaffirm these core principles in a rapidly changing world.

Over time, the MCO has evolved into an international platform for dialogue, research, and collaboration among universities committed to these ideals. With more than 900 signatory institutions from over 90 countries, the Observatory promotes not only the rights of universities to pursue teaching and research freely, but also their duty to engage with the broader challenges facing society. Through initiatives such as academic conferences, monitoring practices, and collaborative research, MCO provides guidance and advocacy to ensure that universities remain ethically grounded, socially responsive, and globally connected. #### **Responsive and Responsible University**

Launched in 2022 by the Magna Charta Observatory, the "Responsive and Responsible University" initiative is a pioneering research effort aimed at reshaping how higher education institutions understand and fulfill their role in society. Recognizing that universities today face growing demands for relevance, transparency, and accountability, the initiative shifts the focus from traditional academic performance to broader societal contribution.

The core objective is to explore how universities across diverse cultural and political contexts can become more responsive to pressing global issues, such as inequality, environmental sustainability, social justice, and technological disruption, while remaining committed to the values of academic freedom and integrity.

The project includes case-based research, institutional reflections, and interactive exchanges. It encourages cross-border learning and experimentation with new models of inclusion, governance, and engagement, generating practical insights that are transferable across regions and educational systems.

#### **Concept Note**

In an era marked by disruption, inequality, and accelerating global change, universities are increasingly being called upon to reimagine their roles, not only as centers of knowledge but as agents of societal transformation. The upcoming international event, "Responsibility and Impact: Global Perspectives from the MCO Research Initiative," provides a unique space for reflection, collaboration, and critical dialogue on the evolving responsibilities of higher education institutions.

This two-day forum, hosted by the American International University-Bangladesh (AIUB), brings together university leaders, scholars, and practitioners from across Europe and Asia to present their research and experiences under the umbrella of the Magna Charta Observatory's global initiative on The Responsive and Responsible University. Participating universities will share case studies, institutional strategies, and reflective analyses on how they are navigating questions of purpose, inclusion, impact, and ethical leadership within their own contexts.

# Responsible University in Times of Humanitarian Crisis: Wroclaw Medical University's Value-Based Response to the Migration Crisis Following the Outbreak of War in Ukraine in February 2022.

Agata Strządała Ph.D. Wrocław Medical University, Poland

This article provides an in-depth examination of Wroclaw Medical University's (WMU) long-term and multifaceted response to the humanitarian crisis resulting from Russia's invasion of Ukraine in February 2022. As both a medical and educational institution, WMU rapidly reorganized its operations to address urgent needs in healthcare, education, accommodation, psychological support, and social integration. Central to this response was the adoption of Management by Values (MBV), which facilitated ethical, flexible decision-making in a volatile context, while complementing the conventional Management by Objectives (MBO) approach. Over time, short-term emergency actions evolved into enduring institutional, educational, and research transformations. These include the incorporation of trauma-informed care, migration-related health, and intercultural communication into academic curricula, as well as the initiation of research on refugee mental health. WMU's case exemplifies the capacity of higher education institutions to act as socially responsible actors, providing a model of good practice for universities confronting humanitarian or social crises.





## Advancing Social Responsibility in Higher Education: A Case Study of Community-Engaged Research and Learning at TU Dublin.

Dr. Mary Deasy and Dr. Catherine Bates. Technological University Dublin, Ireland

This case study examines how Technological University Dublin (TU Dublin) has embedded Community Engaged Research and/or Learning (CER/L) through its long-standing Students Learning with Communities (SLWC) programme, drawing on over sixteen years of experience. Formed through the merger of three institutions with roots dating back to the late nineteenth century, TU Dublin illustrates how CER/L can evolve within a newly established university. Guided by a theoretical framework grounded in civic engagement, organisational change, and trust-building, the study evaluates structures, leadership, and practices that enable or constrain responsiveness to community needs. Evidence from community partners, academic staff, and CER/L support personnel—including an external evaluation of the SLWC programme—identifies key enablers and barriers. Findings highlight the importance of institutional values, cross-sector collaboration, relationship-building, and embedded support systems for long-term sustainability. The study underscores the role of change leadership in balancing processes, tasks, and relationships, offering practical insights for higher education institutions seeking to embed CER/L effectively.





## The Responsive and Responsible University: Mykolas Romeris Uiversity (Lithuania) support to the Ukrainian war affected people

This research project examines the concept of the Responsive and Responsible University, illustrated through Mykolas Romeris University's (MRU, Lithuania) support for war-affected Ukrainian populations. From the outset of the conflict, MRU activated its strategic frameworks, drew on its commitment to Magna Charta Universitatum values, and leveraged its humanistic traditions to respond effectively. The crisis catalyzed the practical application of the University's Third Mission—community engagement and societal contribution. A conceptual review identified four key pillars of a responsive and responsible university: Stakeholder Engagement; Corporate Social Responsibility and the Third Mission; Co-Creation Strategies; and Shared Leadership. MRU's case was analyzed across multiple dimensions, including immediate humanitarian aid, academic inclusion, infrastructure support, advocacy and solidarity with Ukrainian universities, community engagement, activation of national and international networks, and long-term strategic planning. The study highlights how universities can operationalize values-driven practices in crisis contexts and offers implications for shaping future institutional policies and practices to enhance societal responsiveness.






## Responsive and Responsible University: A Case Study of American International University-Bangladesh

This study examines the American International University-Bangladesh's (AIUB) participation in the Responsive and Responsible University initiative of the Magna Charta Observatory (MCO) from 2023 to 2025, implemented in Korail, Dhaka's largest informal settlement. The project linked higher education with social responsibility through participatory interventions led by students and faculty, focusing on women's empowerment, adolescent health, sustainable low-cost housing, and moral education for children. Methods were inclusive, contextually appropriate, and aligned with SDGs and MCO Living Values, drawing on Participatory Action Learning and Action Research (PALAR) and Community-Based Participatory Research (CBPR). Collaborative engagement enabled co-creation of solutions, fostering student learning and improving community awareness, living conditions, and support. Despite challenges such as limited resources, community hesitance, and transient populations, the project informed a tailored Community Engagement Framework, demonstrating AIUB's commitment to ethical, inclusive, and socially transformative higher education.





### Responding to a War Induced Crisis: A Displaced University in Ukraine and the Associated Staff and Motivational Issues

The aim of the study was to assess professional development needs, motivators, barriers, and organisational loyalty among faculty at Ukrainian universities displaced by Russia's war. In February 2024, 121 academics from displaced institutions were surveyed within the Magna Charta Observatory project using a structured online questionnaire covering hard/soft skills, obstacles, motivators, loyalty, and engagement (Gallup Q12). Respondents rated teaching-related competencies strongest, while research and commercialization skills lagged. Key motivators were personal development, social responsibility, and intrinsic academic interest; financial support, recognition, and performance-based incentives were secondary. Principal barriers included psychological stress, lack of time due to supplementary employment, and limited access to training resources. Organisational commitment and engagement were high overall (78% positive). The study concludes that a comprehensive, flexible motivation system aligned with university strategy—combining material and non-material incentives, ensuring safe working conditions, personalising support, and leveraging digital tools and international partnerships—is required to preserve and strengthen the academic capacity of displaced universities under martial law.





## Beyond the Campus Gate: The Role of the University of Tetovo in Addressing Bullying in Pollog Schools

Bullying remains a serious issue in schools, with major psychological, social, and academic consequences for children. This study examines bullying in primary schools in North Macedonia's Polog region and the potential role of higher education—specifically the Faculty of Philosophy, University of Tetova—in addressing it. Using a combined theoretical—empirical approach, it analyzes academic programs, develops targeted modules, and implements workshops with primary pupils and university students. Curriculum analysis reveals little structured content or practical modules on bullying, aside from a few courses in select programs. Workshops showed gains in empathy, social sensitivity, and awareness of bullying's psychological consequences. Findings underscore the need for an inclusive, systematic approach: curriculum revision and a stronger role for higher education in promoting sustainable bullying—prevention and fostering safe, inclusive learning environments for all children. The empirical component comprised workshops in local schools and at the university, which reinforced skills through interactive activities and discussion for participants.
